Highlights for sharing



Just like that 2022 is now in the record book, we had a great year at Brundall parkrun. 4,633 people attended and we only cancelled 2 events (New Years Day and Christmas Day).

we thought the below was an interesting view of the history of the Brundall parkrun and shows the shifting patterns we have seen.

We also had 171 unique volunteers who all volunteered around 966 times in 2022. Great to see the community come together for parkrun on a regular basis. Each week we usually require 15-20 people to put on these free events.

2022 was our 2nd highest amount of parkruns we have completed (52 events) since we started. While our average attendances have been lower we are happy with the numbers and in line with expectations with Lingwood, Flegg, North Walsham, Great Yarmouth and Colney opening since we started in 2015. The average time to complete the course is 29:50 and with the introduction of parkwalk we are expecting to go slower in 2023 and take our average into the 30 minute range.

On the 17th December we were one of a handful of parkruns in Norfolk to open, seeing our 3rd highest attendance of 218 people attend on a frosty and cold but sunny morning.



The additional 5 tonnes of sand having been delivered that week, meant we had a great course for running, and while cold many people thanked us for putting on a run, it's a huge part of peoples wellbeing and mental health with people travelling distances to attend a run!

We also had the 1st Blofield and Brundall scout group selling cakes on that day and they raised £150 towards new kit, a great way to give back to the community.

On the sand front, we have now laid 15 tonnes of sand across the course and the feedback has been great, not just from parkrunners, but all users of the park. It has certainly helped and while the weather has been better this year, we feel the sand is really helping to make the park usable in the winter months. We feel the sand is now bedding in and not hugely noticeable on the eye, but really helping on the feet!

Not sure if there has been any feedback from users of the park.

Recommendation to look at further sand in late 2023. Potentially 20 tonnes in the October period

There is potentially more work to do at the Countryside Park, but currently it's looking good.

2023 we have already held two parkruns, with New Years Day attracting 151 people again, one of only a handful of parkruns to complete on the Sunday.

The last week of December has been very busy. With a Scout take over, Christmas Eve and our 300th parkrun. We also saw the first person to complete 200 Brundall parkruns

Jean Thomson. She is in the Women's 75-79 age range, and the first person to complete 200 Brundall parkruns!

As always we extend an open invitation to any of the land owners committee/Parish Councillors who would like to join us for a cup of coffee to see our great community in action. We feel parkrun is great for wellbeing and mindfulness and brings a local community of all ages together.

Issues you wish Land Management to discuss

- Parking on the Postwick Road, what is the thinking from the committee on this subject
 and where are the lines drawn. Post Covid we put out bollards on the road, but we have
 not done this recently, as we did not believe it to be legal. On the 17th December we
 did receive a complaint about the parking on the Postwick Road. Interested to
 understand the committee view. Aware parking and speed is a hot topic.
- Budgeting funds for further sand on to the pathways in October 2023. I am not sure of the cost of the sand, but would like to continue the work in October 2023. Potentially adding a further 20 tonnes to the course.

Items previously raised and still on our watch list

- Widening of pathways looking at doing this later in the year. (Travaltor side)
- Next steps with the drainage pond. Still no drainage added. Little impact from recent rain and we have not seen the pond starting to fill with water, just leaves.
