

Broadland District Councillor Report for Brundall Parish Council Meeting – 22 September 2025

A successful referendum was held on the Postwick with Witton Neighbourhood Plan on 7 August. 92.7% of those who voted were supportive of the plan. At the Overview and Scrutiny meeting in July the council received an update on the effectiveness of the Public Space Protection Order for vehicle related antisocial behaviour which was introduced in April 2024. The PSPO has so far been effective at reducing vehicle related ASB and the demands on both Police and council services. Regular monitoring will continue.

BDC is a member of the Norfolk Health and Wellbeing board which adopted a five-year Norfolk All Age Autism Strategy in 2024. The strategy has 6 priority areas which are: to improve understanding and inclusion, to improve access to education and support transitions into adulthood, to support adults into employment, to tackle health and inequalities for autistic people, to build the right community support and to improve support in the criminal and youth justice system. This strategy is to be incorporated within the Broadland Health and Wellbeing strategy.

The Broadland Food Innovation Centre has now been in operation for 2 years and is continuing to support growth, innovation and collaboration within the food and drink sector in Broadland. There have been some very positive testimonials from businesses involved.

The Broadland Waste and Recycling vehicle depot at Frettenham has been completely rebuilt and became operational in the first week of September. It has been built to be future proof with the ability to upgrade to fully electric vehicles. There are extensive solar panels on buildings and refuse vehicle parking areas with modern, energy efficient offices and staff amenities. The project has been delivered on budget.

The BDC Business Builder support programme is still open to applications for 2025/2026. Funding and support is available to support business start-ups and existing businesses to invest and grow. There are also Capital grants available of up to £20,000 per case for businesses in rural areas for plans to increase productivity, measures to significantly reduce the carbon footprint and diversifying into new income streams. A third round will open to expression of interests on 1 October and closes on 12 November. The project is part-funded by the UK government.

On 1 September Cllr Laming attended the opening of the impressive new outdoor area at Snowy's Nursery and Pre-school in Brundall. Eleanor put her BDC Members Ward Grant of £1000 towards this project. A huge amount of work has gone in to make these improvements - congratulations to all those involved.

On 6 September in the evening Cllr Laming heard and observed vehicle related antisocial behaviour around Broadland Gate and Broadland Business Parks. The police were already at the scene. A BDC Extraordinary General Meeting was held on Thursday 18 September where councillors voted in favour of a 3 unitary model for government reform. Consultants were employed to look at the data and a considerable amount of information is available in the agenda papers which can be viewed here:

The model for 3 new councils covering East Norfolk, West Norfolk and Greater Norwich will be submitted to the government for consideration by 26 September 2025.

After councils have submitted their proposals, the following stages have been set out for the Local Government Reorganisation process:

Statutory consultation on Final Proposals: it is likely that the

statutory consultation will encompass all Final Proposals submitted for Norfolk; a single unitary model submitted by Norfolk County Council, a two unitary model submitted by South Norfolk Council and our three unitary model.

Decision to implement a proposal: ministers and parliament will decide which, if any, proposal is to be implemented, with or without modification and subject to collective agreement across Government.

Making secondary legislation: The Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) will prepare the necessary legislation, the Structural Change Order (SCO), for parliamentary approval. This will establish the new single tier of local government in Norfolk and make provision to abolish all the predecessor councils.

Transition period: existing councils will continue to deliver services and fulfil their duties until Vesting Day, whilst preparing to transfer all assets, functions and staff when the predecessor councils are dissolved and the new unitary authorities take on the legal duties and powers for providing local government in Norfolk. Shadow unitary authorities, to be formed in May 2027, will develop Implementation Plans to include council tax harmonisation and preparing for the aggregation and disaggregation of services.

New unitary authorities go live: the Government is aiming for new authorities to go live on 1 April 2028 – Vesting Day. Elections to the new unitary councils, in the transition year ahead of Vesting Day, will ensure that those who will be responsible for government in the new authorities are accountable for decisions on transition arrangements.

BDC is developing a Homelessness Mitigation Strategic work plan to address the projected increase in demand for services. This has three work streams which are: Prevention, Provision of temporary accommodation and Improving the options for people to move on from temporary accommodation.

BDC also has a Broadland and South Norfolk Homelessness and Rough Sleeper strategy for 2025 to 2030. Up to July 2025, the council has acquired 47 units of temporary accommodation. It has also set up a Sanctuary Scheme to support survivors of domestic abuse to stay safely in their homes. It has introduced tenancy and independent living skills courses. Between 2020 and 2025, 679 social housing homes were delivered. However, there is still an increased demand on services, due to the ending of private rented tenancies as a result of significant private rent increases, and households fleeing domestic abuse.

BDC has developed a draft GNLP Policy 2 Sustainable Communities Supplementary Planning Document (SPD). This expands on the existing GNLP policy to give additional guidance. Developers will need to prepare a Sustainability Statement and Delivery Statement for relevant applications. SPD's are material considerations in the determination of planning applications.

A 6 week public consultation on this document will commence soon.

BDC has developed a draft Greater Norwich Green Infrastructure Strategy Supplementary Planning Document. This is to go out soon for a 6 week public consultation. Once adopted it will be a material consideration when assessing planning applications. The focus headings are: Healthier happier and more active people, Nature rich places, Climate resilient places and Prosperous communities. It is to be used by developers when designing and proposing new developments. The plan is to publish the final SPD in early 2026.

BDC has also produced a Draft Design Code for BDC and SNC (South Norfolk Council). A 6 week public consultation on this code will commence in November. If adopted, the Design Code will assist planners in negotiating the design details of new residential development schemes. It will apply to all residential schemes between one and 500 dwellings. Large scale schemes need to undertake a Master Planning process.

BDC is designing a new "Future for Nature Fund". This will provide funding nature restoration projects in the district, such as mini-forests, pond creation or restoration, scrub improvements and circular walks. Projects should meet the objectives of carbon sequestration, biodiversity enhancement and access to green space. The fund will be open to bids from the beginning of November. A workshop on the types of projects and how to plan and submit a bid will take place at Lingwood Village Hall on Wednesday 15 October.

Norfolk Warm Homes delivers Government funding across Norfolk to improve the energy efficiency of properties for eligible residents and BDC is an active partner in this. Over £3.9m will be allocated in the next 3 years to support private owner-occupiers and private tenants/landlords. For more information see:

Letters will be sent to potentially eligible households in the Autumn to enhance uptake.

On 9 September Cllr Jan Davis and Cllr Laming met some of the children who had completed the Summer Reading Challenge at Brundall Library, to hand out their certificates and medals. Congratulations to all of those who completed the challenge.

Cllr Laming attended the Neighbourhood Policing Meeting on 17 September which covered a range of areas east of Norwich including the Acle Team area which covers Brundall Ward. The priority for the next couple of months will be Road Safety. A Neighbourhood policing survey will be launched soon to help gather data to assist with decision making. This should be easy to complete and will be launched via a range of channels. The importance of Community Speedwatch, Neighbourhood Watch and reporting any incidents online was mentioned. The next meeting will be on 9 December 2025.
